


Table Talk Conversation Starters

Prepare the Way of the Lord!

The New Evangelization should begin at home. Here are some ideas for Advent for families throughout the lifespan:

1. Have a family Advent

wreath. Traditionally it has 3 purple candles and one pink candle, but white candles with colored ribbons will do. Light another candle each Sunday of Advent and experience the Light of Christ growing brighter with each week as you approach Christmas.

2. Bring out the Manger scene early in the

Advent season. It is a good way for all to focus on the meaning of Christmas. Here are some practices to make into family traditions.

- Create a soft bed for Baby Jesus. Begin with an empty manger and supply straw or shredded paper each time you do a kind deed or pray for someone.
- **Practice waiting.** Put only the shepherds and animals in the stable. Put Mary and Joseph and the donkey at the

opposite end of the house. Move them through the house, a different room each day, as they "journey to Bethlehem." Baby Jesus arrives on Christmas (don't forget where you hid him!). The Kings can also journey and arrive to adore the Christ Child.

3. Celebrate the feast of St. Nicholas on

Dec. 6. This beloved saint can teach us again about generosity and love of those who are needy. Read about him at www.catholic.org/saints

4. Celebrate Our Lady of Guadelupe on

Dec. 12. The Blessed Virgin, carrying the Child within, appeared to a simple man. Contemplate her patient waiting and resolve to learn from her example. She is the Patron of the Americas.



5. Pray for

Prince of Peace. Informed by the daily news, lift up in prayer a different place or situation around the world each day. Always conclude your prayer with a commitment to become a messenger of peace in your family and community.

Las Posadas -

Invite Your Neighborhood into the Meaning of Christmas

Wish you could recapture the Gospel message of Hope for your family and share the joy of the coming of Christ with others in a gentle way?

For many years, our neighborhood has enjoyed organizing a simple Christmas "walk" or posada, a custom we adopted from our Mexican friends. The Christmas Posadas is a



reenactment of Mary and Joseph's search for shelter on the night of Jesus' birth.

During Las Posadas, the community walks around the neighborhood while singing Christmas carols led by "angels." During our walk we visit homes and sing carols. Young and old are invited to dress the part of shepherds, angels, and even animals. A young boy and girl are selected to portray Mary and Joseph.

Mary and Joseph go door to door, and ask if they may enter. Residents have been alerted, by means of a flyer distributed earlier in the week, to tell the weary couple, "No, there is no room here." (The flyer has also invited every resident to participate in the walk if they wish.) After Mary and Joseph have been turned away, the group moves, singing carols as they go. As the journey gets longer and the wind blows colder, all the participants experience a little of the disappointment that Mary and Joseph must have felt as they searched for a safe and warm place for Jesus to be born.

Las Posadas ends when the travelers arrive at a manger set up. Someone reads the Christmas story from the

Gospels, and all pray together for peace, for travelers and for prospective parents. All are invited into a warm house for hot chocolate and real Christmas cheer.

Advent Prayer Service

ALL SING: O Come, O Come Emmanuel, And ransom captive Israel, That mourns in lowly exile here Until the Son of God appear. Rejoice! Rejoice! Emmanuel Shall come to you, O Israel.

Antiphon: O Sacred Lord of ancient Israel, who showed yourself to Moses in the burning bush, who gave him the holy law on Sinai mountain, come, stretch out your mighty hand to set us free.

READING: Exodus 3: 1-15

REFLECTION

To what or to whom are we slaves? In what settings do I hear God call my name? How would you describe the task the LORD has given you?

LEADER: O Wisdom, O holy Word of God, you govern all creation with your strong yet tender care;

R: Come and show your people the way to salvation.

LEADER: O Sacred Lord of ancient Israel, who showed

yourself to Moses in the burning bush, who gave him the holy law on Sinai mountain,

R: Come, stretch out your mighty hand to set us free.

LEADER: O Come, Flower of Jesse's stem, you have been raised up as a sign for all peoples; kings stand silent in your presence; the nations bow down in worship before you;

R: Come, let nothing keep you from coming to our aid.

LEADER: O Key of David, O royal Power of Israel controlling at your will the gate of heaven;

R: Come, break down the prisons walls of death for

those who dwell in darkness and the shadow of death, and lead your captive people to freedom.

LEADER: O Radiant Dawn, splendor of eternal light, sun of justice;

R: Come, shine on those lost in the darkness of death!

LEADER: Holy God, you are constant in your care for those you have

chosen. Help us to never give up on ourselves. Keep us free to

place you first in our time, our heart, and all our priorities.

Come, Lord Jesus, come! ALL SING: Rejoice! Rejoice! Emmanuel Shall come to you, O Israel.

Family Gratitude Activity



Thanks to Catalina and Darren Shorkey, Holy Trinity, Glen Burnie, who lead a family life group that meets monthly at the parish center for dinner, prayer, and a family program.

This activity celebrates our family tree. And just like trees, God provides our families with all that they need to be strong.

- 1. Review with your children the parts of a tree: roots, trunk, branches, and leaves.
- 2. Our roots are those people who have gone before us—the people in our past who started our families, like our grandparents, saints, etc.
- 3. Our trunk is the people who give us support every day—the people in our present who help our family, like our godparents, family friends, teachers, priests, brothers, sisters, deacons, lay ministers, etc.
- 4. Our branches symbolize our reaching out to the world, an important part of keeping our family strong—the gifts that we share with the world, like musical gifts and talents or our own family's faith. As we reach out like branches, we are working towards a future with God.

- 5. Just as God sends water and sun for the tree to grow, God's creation also helps us to be strong. Everything around us from the trees to the ocean is an important part of nurturing our family faith. INSTRUCTIONS: Work together with the members of your family. Each family receives this instruction sheet, a picture of a tree without any leaves, 4 paper leaves, about 3 inches wide, and a form on which to indicate their answers to the following questions:
- 1. Write your family's name under the "tree" illustration.
- 2. Think of names of people from your family's past that helped you to build and strengthen your family unity and faith. Write ONE name on one of the leaves. Glue it on your "tree."
- 3. Name the people who currently are positive influences on your family. Write them on another leaf.
- 4. Identify the gifts that your family has that you are able to share with others, now and in the future. Write them on another leaf.
- 5. Write the gifts of creation for which your family has appreciation. Write the ideas on the last leaf. Paste all your leaves on the tree page.

Gather the families for a gratitude prayer. During the prayer, invite one member of each family to share ONE item from each of their leaves with the group.

Preparing for Christ's Birth

Jesus is with us every day and in every way. During Advent, we set time aside to prepare our minds, hearts and homes to anticipate (watch, plan and wait for) his coming. We look for specific ways to get ready to welcome the gift of the Christ Child's love into our homes and world. Prayer, activities, family discussion, reaching out to others – there are numerous ways to open ourselves to Christ's love and to share his love with others.

- Advent wreath An advent wreath helps us to mark the passage of time in a prayerful way as we prepare
 for the Christ Child to be born anew in our hearts and homes.
- Family Discussions & Family Christmas traditions whenever families share special moments, we focus on the true meaning of Christmas.
- Christmas Cards If kept in a basket, a card can be pulled each night and a prayer said for the particular "gift" that person brings to your life.
- Service to Others Jesus brings love and hope into our life. By doing something good for others, we share Christ's gift of love.

Think It Through If you had been able to visit the Christ child when he was young, what gift would you have given him?
Mother Teresa found Christ in every person. Is someone you know Christ-like? Who is that person and how are they Christ-like?
What are some of the signs of Christmas and how can we find God in those signs? (For example, Christmas lights are a sign of Christ who brings light to the world, etc.)
Act Kindness is a reflection of Christ's love. Who do you know that needs someone to be kind to them? And in what way can you extend that kindness?
Scripture " they shall call him Emmanuel, which means "God is with us" Matt 1:22-23
