

Respecting Differences




Families of origin teach each of us the "right way" to be a spouse and parent!


Recognizing our differences early leads to understanding and growth.

1/2 of Marriages Are Mixed-Religion

- Interfaith couples come with lower levels of church involvement and lower expectations.
- They are more likely to drift from church practice.
- Encourage each partner to know and practice his religion.




